CHAPTER-I

AGRICULTURE DEPARTMENT (GRANT NO.48)

Introduction:

Agriculture and its allied activities are of overriding importance for the people of Assam as sources of livelihood, employment and as a way of life since more than 70% of the population still are dependent on this sector for their livelihood. Food security and poverty alleviation are two major challenges of the sector to be overcome in the interest of welfare of the farming community who are mostly small and marginal farmers (86.2% Agriculture census 2015-16).

As far as the uses of Agricultural Land, net area shown is 27.24lakh Ha, i.e. 35.05% of geographical area. The gross cropped area is 38.72 lakh Ha. Average land holding in the State is 1.09 Ha (Agriculture census of 2015-16) against a National Average of 1.08 Ha. Cropping intensity of the State is 140.83% (2021-22) against a National Average of 152.7% (2020-21). This signifies that a large percentage of cultivable land is not put to use annually and is one of the major challenges stands from the fact a large area of land, i.e., 16.27 lakh Ha is under mono cropping. However, this also offers an opportunity to enhance the production and productivity.

Assam has a huge potential of food grain production but productivity is normally low in most of such grains. This is so because the major portion of the plain lies in the Brahmaputra Valley which incidentally is prone to chronic flood and bank erosion. Because of this risk of flood, input management in the Khariff season is at very low level. The summer crop in Assam also has a risk of irrigation water deficit, especially because of lack of viable surface irrigation channels.

But ceiling for Rs. 226.00 Lakh could not be drawn. So committed liability remained for an amount of Rs.226 lakh, which was placed as SD budget during 2024-25. that was not received. Hence, Rs.226 lakh is placed for the budget of 2025-26.

The Government of Assam has proposed to procure 25% of the total production of mustard /rapeseeds as per price support scheme (PSS)'s guidelines, farmers/growers of the state at MSP(at FAQ norms), to be declared by the Union Govt. The ASAMB has already been notified as a state level agency (SLA). The State Government shall have to provide revolving fund for the purpose. However, it is expected that approximately 10000 MT of mustard/rapeseeds shall be procured during this year. As such, for implementation of the programme in the state during Rabi-2025, ASAMB prepared this scheme for an amount of Rs.200 lakh under SOPD for FY 2025-26

The Assam Agriculture Commission was constituted on March. 2024 and has been actively working to provide recommendations to the Agriculture and Allied Departments under the Government of Assam. The Commission comprises a five-member committee, including a Chairman. To facilitate the payment of remuneration and the organization of review meetings and field visits etc. for the Commission, financial provisions for these expenses are necessary in the budget, 2025-26.

NEATEHUB caters to both ideation stage startups (Ishanya) and early-stage ventures (Saranva) with grants of up to ₹5 lakh and ₹25 lakh, respectively supported under the RKVY-RAFTAAR programme. GIS Lab (Support to Existing GIS Lab)

The objective of establishing the GIS Lab was to use GIS tools to identify areas with low productivity rice-fallows and areas prone to stress (flood and water stress), in order to implement improved cropping systems and promoting climate resilient varieties tailored to specific conditions of each site approach aimed to maximize productivity while addressing

challenges such as climate stress.

The initiative to establish a College of Agriculture at Patharkandi aims to address the critical gaps in agricultural education, research, and skill development. The Barak Valley, comprising the districts of Cachar. Sri Bhumi, and Hailakandi, possesses significant agricultural potential but is still remains untapped due to several challenges, one important among them being the farmers' inadequate access to the latest scientific innovations and technologies and also extension and advisory services.

At present there is insufficient engineering manpower to demonstrate, train, help in repairs/maintenance and guide farmers on Farm Mechanization at Block and District level in Assam. Therefore, to monitor and implement the government policy and programme of farm mechanization more effectively and efficiently at farmer's doorstep, trained Agricultural Engineering graduates are urgently required. It is desirable that these engineers be educated and trained in Assam so that they can provide solution to engineering issues relevant to Agro ecological situation of Assam.

AGRICULTURE DEPARTMENT (GRANT NO. 48)

After the presentation of the Budget in the House for financial year 2025-26 on 10th March, 2025 the Departmentally Related Standing Committee held the meeting on 13th March, 2025 to discuss on Grant No.- 48 relating to Agriculture Department. At the same time, the Committee also considered the action taken report on the recommendation made on 2024-25 in its 26th report presented to the House on 21st February, 2024.

The Budget provision made under Grant No.-48 relating to the Agriculture Department 2025-26 is as follows:-

Out of the total budget provision of Rs. 1, 94, 387.91 lakh made for the financial year 2025-26. Rs. 1, 58, 236.94 lakh and Rs. 3,6150.97 lakh have been earmarked under the Revenue and Capital Head respectively. It seems that for the financial year 2025-26 an amount of Rs. 48, 455.60 lakh has been decreased than that of the previous year's revised Budget Estimates (2024-2025).

The Budget estimate under Grant No.48 is Rs. 1, 94, 387.91 lakh presented before the House for approval. The total allocated money is proposed to be spent in the Revenue and Capital expenditure respectively.

PRELIMINARY STATUS REPORT DEPARTMENT: HORTICULTURE (GRANT NO.67)

Horticulture sector comprising Fruits, Vegetables, Flower, Spices, Medicinal and Aromatic plants, Mushroom, Bee keeping and their value addition has become a viable option for farmers and entrepreneurs of the State to augment their income. It is a means of nutritional and health security for both urban and rural masses. It also generates employment opportunity to the unemployed educated youths. Horticulture also provides opportunity to augment State Gross Domestic Product (SGDP) through export of horticultural produce to domestic and international markets.

Govt. has allocated a schematic amount of Rs. 25360.92 Lakh including Non budgeted schemes of RKVY (Horticulture). Budgeted & non budgeted Schemes during 2024-25 are as follows:

HIGHLIGHTS OF CENTRALLY SPONSORED & STATE SCHEMES.

1. Horticulture Mission for North East and Himalayan States (HMNEH):

This is a Centrally Sponsored Scheme implemented in the State with a 90:10 (Central Share: State Share) sharing pattern since 2001-02. The main objective of the scheme is holistic support in production of high value crops, production of quality planting materials, development of project based activities & market infrastructure, farm mechanization, plant protection, skill development and post harvest management in food processing sector. The scheme provides 50% Govt, assistance for following major components:-

- 1. Planting Material Production- Establishment of Nurseries under Public (100% assistance) and Private sector (50% assistance).
- 2. Area Expansion- Under high value fruit, vegetable, spices and flowers-Dragon fruit. Strawberry, capsicum, turmeric, ginger, Orchid, Anthurium.
- 3. Mushroom Spawn production unit & mushroom production unit
- 4. **Protected Cultivation** Naturally ventilated tubular structure, bamboo structure poly house/ shade net house, plastic mulching film.
- 5. Horticulture Mechanization- Power tillers, self propelled machineries -Pole pruner, power operated sprayer, foot sprayer, garden tools.
- 6. Post Harvest Management Farm gate pack house, cold room, cold storage, primary processing unit, food processing unit, integrated pack house, Refrigerated Vehicle.
- 7. Pollination Support through Bee Keeping
- 8. Capacity Building of farmers & technical staff- short term training & Skill training on Gardening. Green house operator, organic farming.

2. Pradhan Mantri Krishi Sinchayee Yojana- Per Drop More Crop (PMKSY-PDMC):

The Govt. of India has introduced the centrally sponsored scheme of PMKSY-PDMC with objective to enhance water use efficiency in the farmer's field by promoting appropriate technological intervention of Micro Irrigation like Drip and Sprinkler irrigation systems and encourage the farmers on water saving and conservation in existing water source. Under the scheme, 55% assistance is given for Small and Marginal farmers and 45% for other farmers with additional top up of 30% from state SOPD-G scheme.

Another component of PMKSY-PDMC is Other Intervention (OI) component which is implemented as a supplementary component for creation of micro water storage activities and efficiently water conveyance in rain fed areas. Subsidy pattern for the component is 50:50 between Government and farmers.

3. Mission Organic Value Chain Development for North East Region:

Realizing the potential of organic farming in the North Eastern Region of the country. Govt. of India launched this special scheme during the 12th plan period. The scheme aims at development of certified organic production in a value chain mode to link with consumer and to support the development of entire value chain starting from inputs, seeds, certification to the creation of facilities for collection, aggregation, processing, marketing and brand building initiative etc. Till 2023-24, assam has completed Phase-I, Phase-II and Phase-III in 17 districts where 22 nos of organic FPC's were formed and 20,000 ha area has been converted to organic. From

2024-25, Gol approved MOVCD Phase-IV for a period of three years where 11 no.s of Organic FPC's will be promoted and 5500 ha area will be converted to organic. The registration of the new FPC's have been completed.

4. Rashtriya Krishi Vikas Yojana(RKVY), Horticulture:

The RKVY aims at achieving 4% growth in the Agri-horticulture sector during the XI and XII plan period, by assuring a holistic development of agriculture and allied sectors. The main objectives of the scheme are to incentivize the states so as to increase public investment in agriculture and allied sector in a flexible mode so that local priorities can be emphasized. To bring about quantifiable changes in the production and productivity of various components of agriculture and allied sectors and thereby increase farmers return. The fund under RKVY is received under Grant No. 48 from the Directorate of Agriculture, Assam.

5. States Own Priority Development Schemes (SOPD):

In horticulture sector, SOPD aims at skill development of rural and urban youths through imparting training on food preservation, maintenance of Govt assets like building, progeny orchards, production of quality planting materials, preservation of local species and taking up innovative schemes like biodegradable plat making from areca nut leaf sheath. State Floriculture Mission has also been taken up under SOPD. Work on Development of Orchid Farm is in progress and will be completed by August 2025.

Significant achievement under different schemes

1. Under Horticulture Mission for North East and Himalayan States (HMNEH)

- 1. Centre of Excellence for vegetables under Indo-Israel Agricultural Project (IIAP) at Khetri, Kamrup (M) is near completion where modern Israeli agricultural technology for cultivation of vegetables will be demonstrated and subsequently, it will be transmitted to the farmers of the state by providing training in the centre itself. Already a national level training has been organized in collaboration with MASHAV-Embassy of Israel, New Delhi where officers from different states has participated and they were provided with skill training about micro irrigation and fertigation system along with soilless cultivation under protected condition. Total project cost is Rs.583.00 (L). The Centre will be inaugurated within the month of April 2025.
- 2. Setting up of Freeze Drying Processing unit for fruits and vegetables at Barpeta Road with project cost of Rs.400.00 (L) which will facilitate value addition of all kind of perishable fruits and vegetables reducing post harvest losses in greater extent. 80% of work has been completed.
- 3. Initiative has been taken for cultivation of off season vegetables under protected condition using low cost Bamboo Poly House on pilot basis in 8 districts namely Dibrugarh, Jorhat, Sivsagar, Golaghat, Sonitpur, Kamrup, Dima Hasao, Karbi Anglong and West Karbi Anglong. Total beneficiary to be covered is 460 nos with an area of 92 ha.
- 4. Setting up of 5 no of Mushroom spwan laboratory in public sector (DH&FP, HRS, Kahikuchi, KVK Tinsukia, KVK Jorhat, Horticulture college Nalbari) and 3 no in private sector (Dr Aparna Rabha Boko, Mr Basanta Chiring Pkookan, Titabar and one at Udalguri) to make mushroom spwan available locally.
- 5. Setting up of Assam Lemon processing unit at Tihu with project cost of Rs.300.00(L). 70% of work has been completed.
- 6. Setting up of Food processing unit at Jamuguri Hat with project cost of Rs.269.00 (L) .80% of work is completed.
- 7. Setting up of 27 no of primary processing units for processing of perishable fruits and vegetables.
- 8. Construction of 3000 MT cold storage at Pamohi under Kamrup (M), 7 no of pre-cooling house in Darrang & Udalguri districts and 5 no of Cold rooms in Darrang, Udalguri & Kamrup (M) districts.
- 9. 100 no of mushroom production units set up for employment of rural & urban youths
- 10. 700 farmers are trained on scientific cultivation of fruits and vegetable crops, food processing. Bakery & Confectionery, Mushroom cultivation and its value addition.
- 11. 5000 farmers are trained on scientific rearing bee and honey processing in all 35 districts of Assam under National Bee Keeping

2. Under Mission Organic Value Chain Development for NER:

a) 20,000 ha area already converted to organic crop cultivation involving 19,703 no of farmers formation of 22 no.s of organic farmer producer companies.

- b) 20,000 no.s of on-farm input production units have been set up at farm gate.
- c) 38 no.s of Custom Hiring Centre (CHC) have been set up at FPC level.
- d) 18 no.s of Small Processing Unit have been set up at FPC level.
- e) International Export:
- 1. Exported 24 MT of Pineapple to Dubai and 1.2 MT of Assam Lemon to London in 2022
- 2. 6.000 pieces of organic Assam lemon were exported to London between 2022 and 2023.
- 3. 10 metric tons of organic ginger were exported to Dubai from 2023 to 2024.
- 4. 10 metric tons of organic ginger from Karbi Anglong were exported to Qatar and Oman between 2024 and 2025.

3. Under Pradhan Mantri Krishi Sinchayee Yojna - Per Drop More Crop (PMKSY-PDMC):

- 1. 5790 no of farmers are benefitted covering an area of 5799 ha. In the field of 5790 farmers, 2273 no of Drip Irrigation system and 3517 no of Sprinkler Irrigation System have been installed. 1210 no of pump system. Percentage of Drip Irrigation system is around 27% which indicates that farmers in Assam is around 27% of awareness programs.
- 2. 97 no of awareness programme are conducted in different districts for popularization of Drip and Sprinkler Irrigation Systems among the farmers..

4. Under State Owned Priority Development Scheme (SOPD)

- 1. 15 nos of Areca nut leaf sheath plate making unit distributed and DOCC & TC renovated and repaired in different districts
- 2. Development of Orchid Park is likely to be completed by August, 2025

A Brief Note on Grant No.67

Assam is traditionally rich in horticulture sector and the socio – economic fabric of its people is largely constituted by horticultural components. The horticultural beauty lies in its history, culture, traditions and in the mindset of the people- which has imbibed a lot from this science of fruits, flowers, vegetables, spices, plantation crops, root & tuber crops, nut crops, medicinal, aromatics, mushroom, bee keeping. The climatic condition of Assam is conducive for growing these wide range of horticultural crops. Horticultural crops occupy about 17% of the gross cultivated area of Assam and annually produce more than 90 lakh MT of various horticultural produces- contributing significantly towards food and nutritional security of the State. But there are two other factors that make horticulture in Assam a very important sector viz. (i) inherent capacity for employment generation and (ii) income generation at farmers' level. No other sector can claim to be in better position in this regard for a state like Assam. Foreseeing this potentiality, Govt. of Assam took a timely decision in the year-2004 to create a separate Directorate of Horticulture and Food Processing in Assam to give focused attention on inherent potentiality of commercialization of various sectors of horticulture. This new directorate has started supporting farmers and horticultural entrepreneurs in their endeavor towards commercialization which is the need of the hour.

Assam being encompassed under one of the 14 global bio-diversity hot spots, the State is endowed with favorable agro climatic conditions that offer wide range of options for farming as well as investment in horticulture sector

In order to reap the benefits of the above mentioned factors and to sustain the growth rate that has been achieved during last decade, the Department has sorted out the under mentioned strategies which remains as a big challenge for the Department.

Aim and objectives-

- > Strengthening production base through area expansion of various horticultural crops and raising their productivity is the greatest challenge before the Directorate and a good beginning has been made in this direction.
- In order to achieve this, the most important aspect is availability of quality planting materials of fruits, vegetables and flowers etc. within easy reach of farmers.
- Encourage nurseries to produce quality planting materials from genuine mother plants using latest technology.
- Import quality planting materials from ICAR farms for propagation at departmental and private nurseries
- > Rejuvenation of senile orchards for enhancing productivity of fruit crops.
- High density planting for more return per unit area
- Special emphasis on protected and off season cultivation.
- Thrust on horticulture mechanization and use of modern tools to enhance efficiency of labour and minimize cost of production.

- Thrust on micro irrigation for judicious use of available irrigation water through sprinkler and drip system.
- Precision farming
- Popularization of High Value Crops like Capsicum, Orchid, Anthurium. Strawberry. Apple Ber. Dragon fruit, Rambutan etc.

Major initiatives taken up by the Directorate -

- Massive area expansion programme of thrust crops like Orange, Pineapple, Banana, Apple-ber, Ginger, Turmeric, Dragon fruit, Strawberry and flower crops etc.
- Farmers training to infuse commercial concept amongst traditional horticultural growers in India or abroad.
- Maximum focus on raising productivity of various commercially potential crops of Assam through use of better technology, management practices, bee keeping and planting materials is being given
- Establishment of Model Horticulture Nursery at Byrnihat, Guwahati where Root Stock Block and Mother Block of various new varieties fruit crops has been established.
- Up-gradation of private nurseries with Govt. subsidy under specific guidelines to generate adequate quality planting materials of horticultural crops
- Formation of FPOs and FPCs has been encouraged for doing the Agri-Business among the small holders.
- Post-harvest aspects like pre-harvest treatment, scientific harvest, setting up of pack houses, collection centres with grading facilities and transport facilities are given due importance.
- ❖ The concept of organic farming is induced in the mindset of farmers and cultivation is started in ten clusters covering nine districts. The districts are-Sonitpur, Dhemaji, Golaghat, Majuli, Kamrup, kamrup(M), Chirang, Cachar, Nalbari, Kokrajhar, Udalguri, Lakhimpur, Morigaon
- Pack houses are constructed in production pockets.
- ❖ Bee keeping is given due importance and training conducted at various level
- Mushroom cultivation is getting due importance
- Green houses provided to farmers for off season production of vegetables and raising of seedling
- Introduction of new and high remunerative crops like Strawberry, Apple Ber and Musk melon, dragon fruit, etc.
- Installation of Drip and Sprinkler Irrigation Systems for increasing water use efficiency in the farmers field which enhances water saving and conservation in the existing water source.

BUDGET PROVISION

HORTICULTURE AND FOOD PROCESSING DEPARTMENT (GRANT NO.:67)

The Departmentally Related Standing Committee on Development (B) Department discussed the Budget provision made under the Grant No.- 67 relating to the Horticulture and Food Processing Department for the financial year 2025-26. At the same time the Committee also considered the action taken report on the recommendations made for 2024-25 in its 26th report presented to the House on 21st February, 2024.

The Budget provision made under Grant No.- 67 for the financial year 2025-26 is as below: ----

Out of the total budget provision of Rs. 21,718.80 lakh made for the financial year 2025-26. Rs. 20, 946.74 lakh and Rs. 772.06 lakh have been earmarked under the Revenue and Capital Head respectively. It seems that for the financial year 2025-26 an amount of Rs. 2, 132.01 lakh has been increased than that of the previous year's revised Budget Estimates (2024-2025).

The budget estimates under the Grant No.-67 is Rs. 21,718.80 presented before the House for approval. The total allocated money is proposed to be spent in the Revenue and Capital expenditure respectively.

CHAPTER-II

OBSERVATIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee throughly discussed all the paras under the grant nos 48 & 67 (Horticulture) and observed the action taken report on the recommendations of the DRSC on Development (B) Departments for the year 2024-25. After threadbear discussion the Committee admitted recommendations made as under.

GRANT NO. 48

1. The Committee reiterates its earlier recommendatin no. 2 to incorporate the APART project (Assam Millet and Assam Fodder Mission Schemes) in the State Budget for the FY 2025-26.

Further, the Committee recommended that the concerned department should take initiatives to complete the construction of ADO offices and Knowledge Centers in the State under the APART Project.

- 2. The Committee reiterates its earlier recommendation no. 3 regarding relaxation of moisture content limit in Assam from 8% to 12% for procumement Mustard seed at MSP by the Govt. of Assam.
- The Committee reiterates its earlier recommendation no. 7 regarding Crop Insurance in the State which needs to be settled within a specific time.
- 4. During the course of discussion, the Committee observed that the distribution of fertilizers in Kharupetia is not adequately maintained by the Department.

Therefore, the Committee recommended that the Department should undertake an enquiry about it and take steps for equal distribution of fertilizers among the farmers.

5. The Committee observed that there are not sufficient numbers of cold storage in the State as a result; farmers lost their capitals during the peak season of crop and vegetable cultivation.

Therefore, the Committee recommended that the Department should establish small cold rooms in each and every development block of the state.

6. During the meeting, the Committee observed that the level of commercialisation of agricultural products among the small farmers in the State is very low.

Therefore, the Committee recommended that the Department should initiate necessary awareness programmes among the farmers to popularise multiple cropping and business oriented farming across the State.

7. During the course of discussion, the Committee observed that the hybrid seeds supplied by the Department are not properly germinated subject to loss of the farmers during cultivation.

Therefore, the Committee recommended that Department should supply good quality seeds to the farmers for more production. The committee also recommended for the preservation of local breeds to boost the yields and ensuring healthy crops.

8. The Committee observed that the state is still lacking behind in application of Agricultural machineries and tools in the field of Agriculture.

Therefore, the Committee recommended for establishment of a separate Engineering Directorate for massive application of Agricultural machineries, improvement of irrigation process and the products.

9. The Committee observed that farmers often burn haystack after harvesting of crops to clear their fields for the next crop causing air pollution and causes health hazards.

Therefore the Committee recommended that the Department should execute some new scheme to convert the haystack in-to "waste to wealth" promoting alternative uses of the haystack for fodder, bio-fuel or bio-compost to control pollution and for healthy environment.

With these observations, the Committee recommended that the total amount of Rs. 1,94,387.91 lakh as sought for, under Grant No. 48 (Agriculture) for the Financial Year 2025-26 be approved by the August House.

The Action Taken Report on the recommendation may be submitted to the Committee within 90 (Ninety) days from the date of presentation of the Report in the House.

OBSERVATIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

GRANT No. 67 (HORTICULTURE)

1. During the course of discussion, the Committee observed that there is a vast potential of horticulture and floriculture opportunities in upper Assam districts like Sivsagar and Tinsukia.

Therefore, the Committee recommended that the Agriculture Department should take initiatives for cultivation of flowers and exotic foods in these Districts and provide necessary transport facilities and subsidies to the farmers for transportation of flowers, exotic foods to other places.

2. The Committee observed that there is a huge potential of Pineapple, Bananas, Jackfruit, Ginger. Citrus Lemon, Corn, Sugarcane and Turmeric in different parts of Assam.

Therefore, the Committee recommended the Department to take all possible steps to increase the promotion, production and exportation of these to other the States and aboard.

During the course of discussion, the Committee observed that marginal and small farmers cannot afford the transport cost for carrying their products to the market.

Therefore, the Committee recommended that the transport cost subsidy should be granted to the marginal farmers to reduce wastage of vegetables.

With these observations, the Committee recommended that the total amount of Rs. 21,718.80 lakh as sought for, under Grant No. 67 (Horticulture & Food Processing) for the Financial Year 2025-26 be approved by the August House.

The Action Taken Report on the recommendation may be submitted to the Committee within 90 (Ninety) days from the date of presentation of the Report in the House.

- * Apply Bacillus subtilis (1X10⁸ cfw/g) @ 10 kg/ha before sowing to control rice root knot nematode (Meloidogynegraminicola). The bioagent should be enriched in well decomposed FYM (10kg in 200kg FYM) before application.
- **E. CHEMICAL CONTRL PRACTICES:** New generation pesticides recommended recently are-
- * Two sprays of Chlorantraniliprole 18.5 SC @ 150 ml in 500 lit of water for 1 ha (20ml in 67 lit of water for 1 bigha) at E.T.l. and 20 days after first spraying is effective in managing rice stem borer and rice leaf folder population.
- * Two sprays of Cartap Hydrochiloride 50 Sc@ 2 ml/lit at 30 and 50 days after transplanting can be applied against stem borer and leaf folder.
- * Based on the toxicity profile, the insecticide Chlorantraniliprole 18.5 SC may also be advised to apply against ear cutting caterpillar.
- * Application of neem oil 1.5 ml/kg gives effective protection of stored paddy seed against storage insect pests for up to 9 months without affecting germination.

For rodent pest management in rice, baiting with bromadiolone (0.005%) at panicle initiation stage followed by local bamboo traps (*Endurchitap*) @ 30 traps/ha (4 traps/bigha) at milky stage should be used which gives up to 65-70% reduction in rodent population.
